City Updates

Code Enforcement Officer Introduced

The City of Frost has added a Code Enforcement Officer to assist with maintaining city standards and helping the City respond to concerns in a fair and consistent way. Code enforcement plays an important role in keeping the community clean, safe, and well cared for.

About Drew

Johnathan Andrew Youngblood, who goes by “Drew,” serves as the City of Frost’s Code Enforcement Officer. He is certified through the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR) and has nearly two years of experience in code enforcement. Drew was born and raised in Hill County and has attended schools in Bynum, Hillsboro, and Itasca. He is currently pursuing a bachelor’s degree in applied science of business while continuing to build his experience in the field.

Drew values communication and takes a practical, education-first approach when working with residents. His goal is to help ensure that city standards are understood and applied fairly, while supporting a clean, safe, and well-maintained community.

Code enforcement will focus on working with residents through communication whenever possible. The goal is to make sure everyone understands the requirements in place and has the opportunity to correct concerns before any further action is needed. Most of the regulations involved are not new, but part of the existing city ordinances.

Due to the size of the city, code enforcement services are currently limited to one day per week. This allows the City to address concerns as they arise while continuing to manage services in a responsible and cost-effective manner.

Residents who have questions about city requirements or property concerns may contact City Hall for assistance.

Citywide Cleanup Scheduled

The City of Frost will hold a Citywide Cleanup from **May 9 through May 17** to give residents an opportunity to dispose of unwanted household items and help keep the community clean. Dumpsters will be located at **120 W. Pace (corner of W. Pace and N. Allen)** and will be available for use by Frost residents during the scheduled dates.

Accepted items include furniture, large household items, appliances with refrigerant removed, carpet, and general household debris. Brush, limbs, tires, construction debris, and hazardous waste will not be accepted. All items must be placed inside the dumpsters, and bulk pickup guidelines will apply during the event.

Brush and limbs should not be placed in the dumpsters but may be bundled and scheduled for regular monthly bulk pickup through Republic Services.

We appreciate everyone's help in keeping the cleanup area orderly so the dumpsters can be used safely throughout the event.

Park Cleanup and Improvements

Work has recently taken place at the Frost City Park as part of ongoing efforts to improve the appearance and upkeep of one of the community's most important public spaces. Cleanup activities included trimming trees and brush, removing debris, painting, power washing, and general maintenance throughout the park.

The City would like to thank **Mortenson Construction and local community volunteers** who gave their time to help with these improvements, along with the continued work by city staff to keep the park clean and usable.

These updates are part of a broader effort to maintain the park and make gradual improvements as time and resources allow. The park is an important gathering place, especially during the spring and summer months, and the City looks forward to continuing work that will enhance this space for residents and visitors.

We appreciate everyone who takes pride in our park and helps keep it a place the community can enjoy.

May Election Information

The City of Frost will hold its municipal election on **Saturday, May 2, 2026**. The ballot will include the office of Mayor and two Alderman positions.

Early voting will be conducted through the Navarro County Elections Office from **April 20 through April 28, 2026** at the Navarro County Annex, 601 N. 13th Street in Corsicana. Early voting will not be held on **April 21** in observance of the San Jacinto Day holiday. Early voting hours and additional locations are determined by Navarro County.

On Election Day, voting will take place at **Frost ISD** during normal voting hours.

All residents who are registered to vote are encouraged to participate in the election. Local elections play an important role in the future of the community.
