Public Safety Update

Following recent changes involving the Frost Police Department, the City has worked to ensure residents continue to have access to law enforcement services.

The City of Frost does not currently have a municipal police department. Law enforcement coverage is provided by the Navarro County Sheriff's Office, which responds to calls and patrols our community as needed.

The City understands that changes involving public safety can raise questions. Our priority is to make sure residents know that law enforcement services remain available and, most importantly, know who to call when assistance is needed.

The proposed budget will be discussed during upcoming City Council meetings, which are open to the public. The final budget and tax rate will be adopted in September.

Code Corner

Code Complaints Are Now Available Online

Residents now have an easier way to submit code enforcement concerns to the City of Frost. Our online Code Enforcement portal allows residents to submit a complaint directly to the City and provide information about the concern.

Using the online system helps ensure complaints are documented and routed appropriately for review by the Code Enforcement Officer. Residents can also use the portal to look up the status of a pending code enforcement case.

Because Code Enforcement services are currently limited to one day per week, concerns may not be reviewed immediately after submission. The online system helps the City keep requests organized and address them as efficiently as possible.
